Support a New Project in the Heart of Ottawa

A new exciting project is underway to rejuvenate the presence of Islam in the downtown core. The Ottawa community has out grown the modest building at 312 Lisgar. By the grace of Allah the current building will be demolished for a new structure to better serve the Ottawa Community. Architectural design has been completed with the new four level structure. Collectively this will adequately provide prayer space to meet our needs in Downtown Ottawa. In addition to separate prayer facilities for men and women, the plan provides for offices to accodate Muslim Family Services and Islamic Information Centre.

The full estimated cost of the new project is \$5.1 million Canadian. We realized 1.6 million so far and now need 3.5 million to complete our project. An amount that is far in excess of what the local Muslim community can provide. We are therefore obliged to seek financial assistance from our brothers and sisters nationally and internationally.







Islam Care Centre Appeals for Funds to Rebuild

One of Ottawa's most popular Muslim prayer spaces has turned to the community for help.

The fundraising dinner on October 23rd at the St. Elias Banquet Centre was headlined by Shaykh Abdullah Idris Ali, Secretary-General of Islamic Society of North America –Canada. He raised roughly \$170,000 in pledges from the community.


ICC estimates the cost of demolition and rebuilding to be at least \$4 million, not including the cost of the land.

Raed Arab, the project manager, outlined the features of the building. The new building would, in effect, more than triple ICC's existing space – welcome news for the more than 200 people who crowd into the small location for Friday prayers every week. The extra space will be used in part to expand the library, offices and prayer halls for women and men. There are also plans to establish a community centre and a regular soup kitchen. The first phase of the project -- filing a site plan and zoning application with the City -- is completed and the center has received permission to demolish the current 2.5 storey-building to make way for a 4-storey building.

At the fundraiser, Mr. Khan and Mr. Haji enumerated the services provided by ICC over the last 18 years. In addition to housing a large Islamic library, the centre is a source of information on Islam for Muslims and non-Muslims alike. ICC itself partners with St. Joseph Church on Laurier Ave. to provide meals to about 300 clients each month. ICC has also arranged for two Muslim chaplains to counsel and monitor the needs of inmates at thirteen correctional centres in Ontario. Working with Correctional Service Canada, ICC ensures that rights of Muslim inmates are preserved such as receiving halal meals and facilitation for Ramadan. They receive a prayer mat, a copy of the Quran and access to other Islamic literature.

In order to take care of the growing needs of the community the Centre has recently incorporated "Muslim Family Services of Ottawa" a charitable non-profit organization. MFSO will take over the social services program of the centre including: youth, programs to rehabilitate and reintegrate young offenders, assistance to new Muslims and Muslims new to Canada, counseling for individuals and families.

In all its work, the centre's primary goal is da'wah (providing information on Islam to others). At the fundraising event, several participants spoke of coming to Islam through ICC. Sakina bint Erik mentioned that while the centre has gone through many changes over the years one thing remains constant; its welcoming atmosphere.

City of Ottawa Zoning By-law: 312 Lisgar Street

The current zoning designation of the Subject Property is I1A - Minor Institutional Subzone A as shown in Exhibit "H".



PROFILE OF ISLAM CARE CENTRE

Islam Care Centre (ICC) is an established non-profit organization with charitable status. It became a federally incorporated Registered Canadian Charity on November 18th, 1999. **Corporation No: 368505-5.**

ICC in Ottawa is a significant resource to the community. It was established with a number of goals in mind and with a set of principles that guide its work. Primarily, it is committed to the ideals of strengthening the health and safety of individuals, families and the wider community through the provision of resources to meet the unique needs of the individuals or groups involved.



MISSION

Islam Care Centre provides the Canadian (Ottawa) Muslim community with resources to meet religious and social needs with the objective of establishing a better relationship with the larger Canadian society.

VISION

To have established a collaborative, far reaching, all encompassing network of services and accommodations for Muslims and non Muslims alike.

ICC OVERVIEW

History

Founded in 1992, the Islamic Information (Dawah) Centre, rented a storefront on Cooper Street in downtown Ottawa, the capital of Canada. The Centre opened its doors inviting the general public to understand Islam and get to know Muslims better.

In 1999 the Centre purchased 312 Lisgar Street; this location provided a larger space for prayer. We then officially became Islam Care Centre and expanded our mandate. We started focusing on providing social services to Muslims and to monitor the needs of youth, particularly those at risk- arranging mentoring and outreach programs.









Worship Centre

Our location provides space for prayer minutes away from the Parliament Buildings. This is the only Masjid in Downtown Ottawa. Thus we attract more worshippers for Zuhr and Asr than any other Centre in Ottawa, and facilitate a large attendance for Jum'a prayer.

Resource Centre

Due to it its location downtown the Centre provided information and resources to government agencies, the media, academic institutions and religious organisations facilitating lectures and information sessions and organizating visits to church groups.

Dawah Centre

The Centre has always been a place for people of different faith looking for information on Islam a drop-in centre with easy access and convenient long hours of operation.

Throughout its history the Centre facilitated

Throughout its history the Centre facilitated many to embrace Islam.

Education Centre

Lectures continue to be arranged, both at the Centre and elsewhere, to inform Muslims and the wider Ottawa community about the principles and ethics of Islam.

Halaqas for new Muslims are arranged in an effort to build a better understanding of the practices and ideology of Islam and to cultivate stronger community.

Youth Programs

The youth programs have also expanded. While the Centre continues to offer as many resources as possible to the youth of the Ottawa community, it has been focusing its programs to the following key area:

Educational Programs including weekly Halagas

Camps: The Centre sponsors MYOs annual summer camp and organizes day camps over the course of educational holidays.

Specially tailored programs for those youth who are at-risk.

Designed programs that work towards rehabilitating and reintegrating youth offenders into a supportive Muslim community.

Provides mentorship training for Counsellors to be "Big Brothers and Sisters" for youth at risk.

Sporting activities including a sponsorship program.









Chaplaincy Services

Working in partnership with Correctional Service Canada and the Ontario Multi Faith Committee, the Centre has fostered a community that allows for individuals to develop themselves while serving their sentences and then to become welcomed members of society upon their release.

The centre ensures that inmates receive a prayer mat and Qur'an (in a language of their choice) as well as access to other Islamic literature, and monitor that their religious rights are preserved, in particular, to guarantee that they receive halal meals and allowed to do their prayers and observe Ramadan.

ICC provides two permanent Muslim Chaplains to the federal penitentiaries in Ontario. Chaplains serve to the following Institutions to ensure that inmates have access to the spiritual needs and connection of their choice.

Food Bank and Soup Kitchen

The Muslim Food Bank of Ottawa originated at Islam Care now serving more than 500 clients weekly.

In 2008 we became involved in providing meals for about 300 needy citizens on a monthly basis in cooperation with St. Joseph Church on Laurier Avenue a project that has given Muslims a good image in Ottawa and providing halal Tuesdays at the Mission.



New Immigrants

As more Muslims moved into the area, the Centre continues in its role as a channel of resources to assist new immigrants.

Linkage with many of the government agencies responsible for providing assistance to these newcomers have been formed so as to ensure that Muslims new to Ottawa can find the financial, legal and social assistance needed to establish themselves in a meaningful manner

Interfaith Programs

ICC represents the Muslim community at Multifaith commitees and forums on a variety of programs including the environment, poverty, and peace initiatives and Ontario Multifaith Council.





Muslim Family Service of Ottawa

As numbers of Ottawa Muslims grew in the last three decades, immediate need to establish a professional organization which will deal with social issues related to individuals and families and their challenges grew as well and has now become of paramount importance.

In May 2011, Muslim Family Services of Ottawa (MFSO) was founded and a board appointed to carry out the mission and the goals of the organization.

MFSO is a full social service agency that primarily, but not exclusively, serves the needs of the Ottawa Muslim community.

ISLAM CARE CENTRE MONITORS INMATES AT DETENTION CENTRES

For the past six years Islam Care Centre of Ottawa, has been contracted by Correctional Service Canada to provide religious and spiritual care to Muslim inmates serving time in the federal correctional system, in eleven (11) institutions in the Ontario province.

The Centre ensures a regular presence in each of these federal institutions where Muslim offenders are housed. representing the spiritual dimension of life as part of a holistic understanding and approach to corrections. Spiritual counselling is offered on individual and group basis; establishing relationships on a spiritual perspective and within a theological understanding of life: compassion, forgiveness, guilt complex, anger control, self-worth, grief and repentance and other significant components of human existence. Also, when appropriate, the Imams get involved with offenders' families - as in crisis intervention and escorting offenders on temporary absences for religious and/or rehabilitative purposes.

Islam Care initiates, directs and coordinates religious services in these correctional facilities, ensuring that all traditional worship services are held when required; working collaboratively to address the religious needs of Muslim offenders to maintain a respectful atmosphere within the chapel environment developing religious educational programs, conducting prayer and Qur'an study groups, personal growth and training of volunteers. Our Imams are also actively involved in the development of offender correctional plans and strategies including parole officers, psychologists, health care professionals and other correctional staff.

Islam Care also interprets the needs and concerns of persons affected by the criminal justice system within the faith community; and educate members concerning their role in the safe and timely reintegration of offenders. This includes the recruitment and training of volunteers for prison work and to be mentors of youth at risk to offend and to be counsellors for those recently released, assisting them to rehabilitate and reintegrate. Islam Care is also involved in Restorative Justice programs and participates with other groups in the promotion of restorative justice principles.

Also, the work of Islam Care with CSC focuses on the integration of spiritual services to Muslim offenders into the life of the institutions by involvement with other chaplains and correctional staff; through developing a theological understanding of existence and experience in the context of multi-faith programs within the institution; integrating a portrayal of Islamic spiritual values in the course of providing spiritual services to inmates, and acting as a resource to the institutions as a whole by providing a focus on the spiritual dimension of life reflecting on all inmates.

Imam Yasin Dwyer, based at Joyceville Institution in Kingston, and Imam Refarz Alli from Toronto are currently under contract with Islam Care to provide the services described above. The Centre is committed to support the Imams and the Muslim offenders who seek guidance and support, aspiring to be worthy Canadian citizens. With the support of the Muslim community in Ottawa, Islam Care will make every effort to maintain the standard of service being provided and to contribute positively to foster a safe, secure and prosperous society.

Islam Care Centre is pleased to continue serving Muslim offenders incarcerated in the federal prison system. However, this noble work is conditional upon community support. With community awareness and financial support from generous donors, Islam Care will provide the necessary support: Quran, religious books, prayer mats and other religious material to offenders who are on the path of repentance and rehabilitation. The journey of faith for many Muslim offenders depends on the support and prayers of the faith community. Islam Care is dedicated to be a catalyst for change in the lives of Muslim offenders into the future, with God's help and support.

Goals and Motivations

The Islam Care Centre is a significant resource to the Ottawa community. It was established with a number of goals in mind and a set of principles to guide its work.

Primarily, the Centre works with individuals and families to achieve their full potential, and strives to meet the most pressing needs of our community, by drawing strength and motivation from their Islamic identity. Islam Care cooperates with other organizations striving to reach our goals through social services, community partnerships and advocacy.

Background and History

The Centre was founded in 1992, then known as the Islamic Information Centre (Da'wah Centre), in the heart of downtown Ottawa. Its stated purpose was to invite the general public to learn more about Islam to build relationships within the non-Muslim community and a growing Muslim community. Its purpose was to become a resource for different government agencies, the media, various academic institutions, other religious groups and individuals looking for information on Islam.

Soon the programs and projects began to expand. As information delivery was the primary goal, the Centre began sponsoring lectures at local universities, high schools, churches and to any group seeking information. Literature was made available on its building to anyone seeking information.

educational initiatives. He said that in some areas, these initiatives have helped reduce high school drop out rates among poverty groups from 50% to just 10%. By helping more youngsters obtain the basic educational tools, faith groups can help break them and their families break out of the cycle of poverty.

Tony Martin (NDP, Sault Ste. Marie) said that Canada Poverty Elimination Act in concert with a solid plan on eliminating poverty is needed in Canada. Such a plan would ensure that institutions are able to grasp the real meaning of poverty and set up measures towards its elimination. He said that faith groups have a role to play in supporting such legislation when such private member bills are raised in the House of Commons.

Raymonde Folco (Liberal, Laval - Les Iles) spoke about how poverty is experienced among immigrants. Immigrant groups face issues of exclusion from mainstream culture and general isolation often due to language barriers. This hinders their ability to find jobs, knowing the services available to them, and getting adjusted to life in Canada. The challenge of isolation strongly affects older immigrant women. She said faith groups can help immigrants overcome these issues and break the isolation. She also stressed how accessible and affordable day care programs have helped immigrant women in Quebec support their families.

Yves Lessard (Bloc Québecois, Chambly – Borduas) spoke about the pressing need to assist poverty groups in the Aboriginal community. Faith groups, with their strong values of charity and giving others hope, have an important role to play in reaching out to the poor in these communities.

Youth and Gangs

The Islam Care Centre has been an active participant in a local initiative to combat youth gang involvement. In November of 2009, took part in the initial Faith and Gangs Roundtable event which was hosted by the Ottawa Youth Gang Prevention Initiative (OYGPI) and Crime Prevention Ottawa.

At the November meeting, the Ottawa Police explained the current gang situation to roughly 30 people of various faith communities.

On February 9, 2010, there was a follow up meeting of the Faith and Gangs Roundtable which the Islam Care Centre was once again able to attend. Abdiwahid Osman had a chance to address the crowd and share a Muslim perspective on how to tackle youth gang involvement as well as speak about the particular challenges that Muslim youth face.

The literature collected by OYGPI has

shown that providing a strong mentor to vulnerable youth can help steer them away from gang involvement. This is an area that faith groups have a chance to make an impact.

The Islam Care Centre hopes to form a mentoring program for youth in the coming year. It has long been providing pastoral services to inmates at the provincial jail on Innes Road. Furthermore in autumn of 2009, it has trained a dozen volunteers in mentoring those recently released from jail, providing guidance and support towards a crime-free life.

Aging: Spirituality & Health

The Islam Care Centre coordinated with six other groups to host conference giving a faith-based perspective on aging on March 29. The full-day conference's stated goal was to "Promote an exchange of views on the spiritual and health care issues facing seniors and address the challenges to healthy living."

"I thought it was very well done," says Khadija Haffajee, a longstanding and active member of the Ottawa Muslim community. She said it was very important for Muslims to be represented at such a conference, given that aging affects us all.

"I think it's very important that we participate," says Mrs. Haffajee. "It's

important that they (the service provider community) know about Islamic attitudes towards aging and the aged."

Nazila Isgandarova helped bring that Islamic perspective to the 120 people who attended the conference. Ms. Isgandarova is a chaplain at two long-term care facilities (where they take care of the elderly) in Mississauga.

She facilitated one of the five workshops organized during that day. Her topic was 'Aging and Spiritual Care in a Cultural and Religious Context.' She focused on the spiritual care of Muslim residents in long term care facilities.

"I was very impressed with how she presented being culturally competent," says Mrs. Haffajee.

Other topics covered during the day included the spiritual side of dealing with dementia, the

positive effect spirituality has on health and aging, how music impacts one's spirituality, and how illness can actually be vehicle to strengthen one's faith.

Both Abdiwahid Osman and Sulaiman Khan from the Islam Care centre helped provide Muslim perspectives in these discussions.

The Islam Care Centre was one of seven groups who helped organize the conference, which included the Council on Aging of Ottawa, the Interfaith Network, Help Aged, the Ontario Multifaith Council, Bruyère Community Care, and

the International Order of the King's Daughters and Sons.

Semiannual Memorial Service

On March 27, executives of the Islam Care Centre helped console and lift the spirits of the Muslim attendees at a semiannual memorial service held by a local long-term care facility, the Glebe Centre. Both Abdiwahid Osman and Sulaiman Khan were in attendance to offer prayers and pay respects to the elderly residents of the Glebe Centre who have passed away in the last six months.

"Sulaiman was our Imam for Islam and shared and prayed most appropriately," says Jim Johnson, the Pastoral Services Coordinator of the Glebe Centre.

Mr. Johnson says that the Islam Care executives' presence was especially significant for one of the dementia-afflicted residents who attended the service.

"It was very moving to see one resident when she saw, for her, the Imam (Sulaiman), a wonderful smile came on her face," says Mr. Johnson. He says that having a Muslim representative attend these events is crucial as it helps the Muslim residents connect with their faith and the deep power to uplift that it often brings.

Eventually it began supplying the local libraries with Islamic material - all free for non-Muslims. Quickly, the Centre became the first stop for information on Islam to the entire Ottawa community. Its easily accessible location facilitated this purpose.

Expanding further, the Centre offered the basic community services expected of any faith-based organization (i.e. marriage facilitation, funeral arrangements, family counseling and access to community resources). It soon developed into a focal point of vital information for new Canadians. The geographical accessibility combined with its convenient hours of operation (opened daily) allowed the Centre to develop into a community hub. The Da'wah Centre provided daily prayer

services, including Jum'aa prayers. **Current Activities**

The Islam Care Centre has a long history of providing assistance to inmates at the local Ottawa Carleton Detention Centre. For many years, trained Muslim chaplains ensured that inmates had access to the spiritual connection of their choice. Working also with Correctional Service Canada, Islam Care Centre ensures that inmates receive a prayer mat, a Qur'an (in a language of their choice), basics on Islam (How to Pray) as well as other Islamic literature. This partnership with the federal government agency that regulates the detention centres has fostered a community that allows for individuals to develop themselves while serving their sentence and then become active and welcome members of society upon their

release. The programs run by the Centre help to foster a sense of responsibility within individuals as well as connect these individuals with the resources they need to contribute to the community, with the expectation that these individuals never again find themselves facing incarceration.

The Centre continues to function in the same capacities - as a source of information about Islam to the general public, media, schools and universities, governmental departments and other faith groups. It expanded on many of its roles that revolve around serving the Muslim community. The mosque on site has become even busier at all prayer times, and particularly on Jum'aa, due to an increase of Muslim workers in the

downtown core and the fact that Islam Care Centre remains the only Islamic institution located in downtown Ottawa. Lectures continue to be arranged, both at the Centre and elsewhere, to inform Muslims and the wider Ottawa community about the principles of Islam. These lectures are typically scheduled on a monthly basis. Halagas for new Muslims and for Muslim women are also arranged, in an effort to build a stronger community and help those seeking information on Islam to acquire it easily. Day camps are now offered to the community so that young children can also become involved in their community while learning. These day camps run throughout the year, in the summer (week-long on site) as well as over the course of educational holidays.

The youth programs have also expanded. While the Centre continues to offer as many resources as possible to the youth of the Ottawa community, it has begun narrowing the focus of its programs to three key areas: those youth who are at-risk to offend (commit a crime) due to their environment; those youth who are already offenders; and programs that work towards rehabilitating and reintegrating youth offenders or at-risk youth into a supportive Muslim community.

Programs to further multi-faith dialogue are an area of particular interest to the Islam Care Centre. In more recent years, the Centre has become involved in community projects that work with other faith groups. An example of this includes programs like soup kitchens, which are held in concert with Christian groups like St. Joseph.

As more Muslims moved to the area, from areas outside the Ottawa-Gatineau region, or from other nations, the Centre has continued in its role as a channel of resources to assist new immigrants in the city. Linkage with many government agencies responsible for providing assistance to these newcomers have been formed so as to ensure that Muslims new to Ottawa can find the financial, legal and social assistance needed to establish themselves. These welfare services continue to expand as the community grows and the Centre works hard to ensure that Muslim families in Ottawa are

provided with the resources they need to contribute actively to our society.

Future Developments – New Facilities

Being active for 18 years now, the Directors of the Islam Care Centre have developed numerous ideas to increase and expedite the relentless efforts. A primary goal at this time is to demolish the current building and to rebuild a larger facility that would be more amenable to its programs and aspirations. As the community expands the need to have a centrallylocated Islamic-resource centre becomes essential. Islam Care must then expand its operations in spite of challenges. It plans to garner support from every source, to bring awareness of the invaluable and unique role it plays as a convener and community support in Ottawa.

The new facility will feature a larger storefront area, with a clear space designated for literature and audio-visual resources, to attract the general public. Making these resources easily accessible will ensure that many more people will benefit. Additionally, the library will be updated and maintained so that the latest information, in the latest media options, would become available. As well, we will expand the number of works available not only in English but in French, Arabic and other highly demanded languages.

To address another pertinent issue, the new facility will have larger and much more accessible prayer spaces for the growing number of Muslims who live or work in the downtown core. This is an issue of particular importance. The new facility will provide a much clearer division of the prayer areas from the remainder of the offices and works of the Centre.

The establishment of a functioning and well-maintained youth centre is of critical importance. Given the refocus of its programs on at-risk youth and young offenders, the availability of a facility where youth will find support and social resources, as well as a safe haven to build friendships and foster a sense of responsibility to them and the Canadian community at large, is a dream that Islam Care is endeavoring to push into reality. By providing such an environment, Islam Care will increase its outreach to youth who do need and are looking for a helping hand, and to youth who want to

expand in knowledge and commitment. It also increases the multi-generational profile of the Centre, making it the only centre in Ottawa that is equipped to provide this kind of assistance. Integrating governmental resources with the Islam Care youth centre will also help to establish a foster care system that respects the needs of Muslim youth, and it will help Muslim families to take on greater roles in the foster care system.

The disadvantaged in Ottawa require many resources to break cycles of poverty, addiction and crime. The Centre has for many years, in collaboration with other faith-based community organizations, made an impact in breaking these cycles. If endowed with a larger facility, the programs on the impoverished individuals and families can expand to create a better community. The establishment of a food bank and regular soup kitchen to feed any hungry person are particular goals of the Centre. Islam Care also plans to increase its ability to provide financial welfare and housing opportunities to those in need. To help with crime and addiction, Islam Care will be involved in a group home program to rehabilitate young offenders. As well, the establishment of a shelter for women and children with familial problems is a particularly important goal. In all cases, counseling services which are already provided, can be more easily facilitated in an environment conducive to dealing with such problems. An office area and a clinic dedicated to render these services, to work effectively in as many ways as possible, within the community is imperative to the success of these programs.

The Centre's new facilities will also allow for the rental of office/business space to facilitate the emergence of Islamic institutions – Islamic banks and residential mortgages, publishing and media relations, charitable organizations, etc. This would generate funds to facilitate its programs and services. However, we will also require significant fundraising, and maintenance of a well-established volunteer circle, to manage the increasing number of projects. These issues are much easier to administer when the infrastructure can be navigated more clearly and a space is available to the community to organize any kind of fundraising or awareness event.

Little mosque on a mission

Islam Care Centre aims to build bigger, better facility

It wouldn't be a shock to ee the dismal, run-down white house on Bank and Lisgar streets slated for demolition.

But it may be a shock it's considered a "spiritual hub" to many Muslims in the downtown core.

Surprisingly, the mosque is hoping to tear down the building — only to build a better model, and quickly.

The Islam Care Centre filed a development application with the city two months ago to demol-ish the entire building and rebuild a four-storey building, to better serve their community.

"The Ottawa Muslim population is growing very fast," said Imam Dr. Zijad Delic, executive director of the centre.

The mosque can't keep

The daily noon prayer attracts more than 60 peo-ple and that's "more than any other centre in the city during the day," according

But it's the Friday noon prayer causing the over-crowding. More than 200 people typically crowd into the small location on that day.

"We cannot accommodate how many of them come," said Delic. "We had to have two prayers dur-ing Friday weekly prayer — simply because there is a demand out there."

A main focus is to

"We want this building to have the beauty aspect in it," said Delic. "This (building) doesn't really

"Our building, beside the beautiful (new) build-ing, would look like a hut," said Delic.

The centre is the only Islam institution downtown, with government and downtown workers

frequenting the location.
It also offers family serv-

ices to all denominations.
"I have seen that need in the lives of people and I think almost in every single aspect — social, spiritual, political — you can notice there is a demand that this building be rebuilt and given the beautiful shape

that we want to have." Delic hasn't heard back from the city since he filed the development applica-tion but expects feedback by August.

Once they get the go-ahead, Delic will go full force with fundraising.

He estimates the revamp will cost about \$3 million, which the centre plans to come up with through community fundraisers, help from partners and grants. He hopes to raise all funds needed, so construction can be finished quickly.

Islam Care Centre is an incorporated charitable organization operating in Ottawa since 1992. The centre is located in the heart of downtown core Ottawa. It is particularly busy during Jum'aa, attracting the many Ottawa Muslims working gin the area and the growing number of Muslims moving to the urban centre.

The Centre is the main source of information about Islam to the general public, media, schools and universities, government departments and other faith groups. It sponsors public lectures to special groups – at universities, high schools and churches.

A particular aspect of the Centre is its monitoring of the problems facing youths. It focuses on three key areas: those youth who are at-risk to offend (due to the environment); those youth who are already offenders; and programs towards rehabilitating and reintegrating young offenders. Trained Muslim chaplains provide counselling to inmates at local detection centres. They ensure that inmates have access to Islamic material and guarantee their religious rights, such as providing halal foods. The success of this program is evident in the spiritual development of the inmates, while serving their sentence, and later in becoming responsible members of society, not re-offending.

Islam Care now needs a much bigger Centre to meet the growing needs of the community: larger prayer rooms, space for a library, office space for businesses, meeting rooms, etc. The current building will be demolished to construct a larger, newer and much more suitably organized facility. Programs to further multi-faith dialogue are of particular interest. The Centre is involved in community projects with other faith groups. An example of this is the soup kitchens, which are held on concert with St. Joseph, a Church group.

Assalaamualaykum warahmatullah; I first became involved with the Islam Care Centre in the spring of 2010. I was introduced to the Centre through some colleagues from the University of Ottawa that thought it was a place that had as much to offer me as I had to offer it. They were right. For over a year now, I have been involved with the Centre and I have become well acquainted with its work and felt the impact of its significant contributions to the community.

There is no other organization in Ottawa that does what the Islam Care Centre is capable of. In a community where, for decades, the focus has been on building masajid (mosques) to support the growing Muslim community, many organizations forget our social responsibilities, both to Muslims and non-Muslims in the Ottawa region. The Islam Care Centre does what no other organization can: it creates links within the Muslim community and between the Muslim and non-Muslim communities. It provides resources, often for free, to those in need, regardless of their religious background. It coordinates activities, day camps, events and numerous social services at the same time as maintaining, embracing and epitomizing its Islamic roots.

The potential of this organization is far underestimated. But a shift is happening in our Muslim community.
